

149th MEETING SET FOR OCTOBER 12, 1996

The Aztec Club of 1847 will hold its 149th Annual Meeting at the City Tavern Club in Georgetown, Washington, D. C., on Saturday evening, October 12, 1996. The business meeting will commence at 6:00 p.m. followed by a reception at 7:00 p.m. and banquet dinner at 8:00 p.m. [White tie, black tie or uniform, with decorations.] A separate announcement will provide further details and reservation information.

Our speaker will be Dr. Jeffrey G. Mauck, Ph.D., an independent research historian and co-author of the recently revised *A Thunder of Cannon, Archeology of the Mexican-American War Battlefield of Palo Alto*, published by Texas A & M University in cooperation with the National Park Service. The Aztec Club provided funding that enabled two pen and ink drawings to be commissioned for the book, by military artist Gary Zaboly, about the historical archaeology of the battle which occurred outside Brownsville, Texas. In addition to ownership of the drawings and copyrights, the Club received an acknowledgment in the book, the creation of the Aztec Club is mentioned in the body of the work and a credit will appear beneath each picture in the book. The original drawings will be on display at the Annual Meeting.

Dr. Mauck, who recently published a booklet titled: *The Education of a Soldier: U. S. Grant in the War With Mexico*, will speak about the Mexican War exploits of Ulysses S. Grant and Robert E. Lee.

Make your reservations for the Club's Annual Dinner by remitting your check to the Secretary so that it is received not later than October 5, 1996.



THE AZTEC CLUB NEEDS YOUR HELP!



The Aztec Club of 1847 is one of the oldest patriotic societies, founded in 1847 by American officers serving in the Mexican War. Original members were commissioned officers of the Army, Navy or Marine Corps, Regular or Volunteer, who actually served in

some part of Mexico, Mexican territory or Mexican waters during the War with Mexico (May 13, 1846 to February 2, 1848). Membership in the Aztec Club of 1847 has been highly prized since its founding. Hereditary members are the male lineal or collateral descendants, who have attained the age of eighteen years, of such officers who were original members, or of those officers who would have been qualified to have been original members.

Members of the Aztec Club who wish to nominate someone for membership, be it a son, nephew, cousin or friend, should write the Registrar and include: name and address of the candidate, a brief biography, and the name and service of the qualifying ancestor. Application papers and information will be forwarded to qualifying candidates.

Commo. John Henry Aulick, USN

John Henry Aulick was born at Winchester, VA in 1787. His father's Will bequeathed geography books to John, reflecting his early interest in world travel. John Henry joined the Navy in 1809 as a midshipman on the Rattlesnake and soon thereafter, obtaining a furlough, entered the merchant marine to learn the duties of a sailor before embarking upon those of an officer. On Mar 18, 1811 he was ordered as midshipman to the schooner Enterprise and was present at the capture of the British Boxer in 1813. James Fenimore Cooper, in his account of the action, stated it was Master's Mate Aulick who requested of the Captain to allow them to enter into the engagement. Following the one hour battle, in which Aulick apparently displayed great gallantry, he was accorded the honor of Prize Master, bringing the Boxer into port. He received thanks and a silver medal from Congress, along with a promotion to lieutenant. Thus began a naval career that spanned 54 years, half of which was spent at sea.

Lt. Aulick served in the War of 1812 on the Saranac, Ontario and Constitution. After the War he was on shore duty until 1827 when he was assigned the frigate Brandywine and remained in the Pacific Squadron until 1831 when he was commissioned Master-Commandant of the Washington Navy Yard. In 1834, in command of the sloop Vincennes, he made a cruise around the world of one-year's duration. Upon Aulick's return he was again placed in command of the Washington Navy Yard and remained there until 1837 when he returned to the command of the Vincennes. In 1840 he returned to the Washington Navy Yard for a short while and on September 8, 1841 was promoted to Captain and given the Yorktown.




In February, Capt. Aulick took command the of frigate Potomac and became executive officer of the Home Squadron. became actively engaged off the coast of Mexico. On May 9, 1846, in Brazos de Santiago, Aulick commanded detachment of 500 seamen and marines in land engagement, remaining there until May 12.

On May 18, 1846 he commanded a detachment and proceeded up the Rio Bravo to meet Lt. Col. Wilson in the taking of Burrita. Commo. David Conner, in *Home Squadron*, stated that Aulick's naval force reached Burrita before Wilson and "thus was the first to invade Mexico and there unfurl our flag." (Taylor's forces did not cross the river into Mexico until later that same day.) Aulick occupied Burrita for a time after which he maintained the Gulf blockade, transporting troops along the coast until March 23, 1847 when he took command of the navy battery at Vera

Cruz, in the company of Capt. Robert E. Lee. At 10 a.m. on March 24 Capt. Aulick ordered the battery unmasked and a steady barrage of shells on the Castle of San Juan de Ulloa ensued. On March 27, 1847, Capt. Aulick signed, on behalf of the Navy, the Articles of Capitulation of Vera Cruz whereby Mexico formally surrendered.

On Feb 11, 1851 Aulick was assigned as Commodore of the East India Squadron. Having picked up a number of Japanese sailors lost at sea and returning them to port, Aulick suggested to Sec'y of State Daniel Webster that this afforded an opportunity to open commerce with Japan. On May 9, Webster asked that Aulick lead an Expedition to Japan. On May 10. President Fillmore granted a commission to Commo. Aulick with powers to "negotiate and sign a treaty of friendship, commerce and navigation" with Japan. The East India Squadron embarked on its mission under his leadership from the Susquehanna. Aulick reached the orient by early 1852 but was recalled. Commo. Perry sailed to Japan the following year.

Commo. Aulick was placed on the retired list in 1864, having

served the Union Navy in the Civil War. His son, Cdr. Richmond Aulick (1828-1868), was graduate number 1 of the U. S. Naval Academy (Class of 1846). A resident of Washington for many years, Commo. Aulick remained there until he died in 1873. He was a member of St. John's Church and was buried at Congressional Cemetery, next to his sons. In Commodore Aulick's memory the Navy named two ships, USS Aulick DD-258 and USS Aulick DD-569 (5 Battle Stars, WWII).




SPRING MEETING SUCCESSFUL


